John Seidenberg signed an instrument of gift for the papers on April 29, 2000. Literary rights in the unpublished writings of Jacob Seidenberg in this collection and in all other collections of papers received by the National Archives have been donated to the public. Under terms of the instrument of gift, the following classes of items are withheld from research use:

1. Papers which constitute an invasion of personal privacy of a living person.
2. Papers which are required to be kept secret in the interest of national defense or foreign policy and are properly classified.

## SCOPE AND CONTENT NOTE

Jacob Seidenberg (1914-1996) was a government official specializing in labor arbitration and non-discrimination contracts. He graduated from Temple University in 1937 and received a law degree from the University of Pennsylvania Law School in 1941. During the 1940s he was an attorney with the U.S. War Department, the National War Labor Board and the National Wage Stabilization Board. In 1948 he went to graduate school at Cornell University, from which he earned his Ph.D. in industrial and labor relations in 1951. He then joined the staff of the President's Committee on Government Contract Compliance. The Committee was abolished by President Eisenhower in August 1953 by Executive Order 10479 and was succeeded by the President's Committee on Government Contracts. Seidenberg was appointed Executive Director of the new committee and served until January 1960 when he resigned to become a full time labor arbitrator. The Committee was responsible for enforcing non-discrimination clauses in government contracts. The staff worked with private businesses to help them overcome job discrimination, and developed educational programs against ethnic and racial discrimination. The chairman was Vice President Richard Nixon, and the vice chairman was Secretary of Labor James Mitchell.

In later years Seidenberg served on a number of boards of inquiry involving labor disputes. From 1970 to 1975 he was chairman of the Federal Services Impasses Panel which settled deadlocks in federal labor negotiations.

During his lifetime, Jacob Seidenberg donated the bulk of his personal papers to Cornell University. However, he retained a small quantity of reference material that his family donated to the Eisenhower Library following his death. The collection has been divided into three series. The first series contains information on Seidenberg's personal speeches and writings, including a copy of his doctoral thesis on New York labor injunctions.

The second series contains information on the work of the President's Committee on Government Contracts. The series includes copies of Committee reports and minutes, proceedings of conferences sponsored by the Committee, and newspaper clippings describing the work of the Committee. Of particular importance is a detailed history of the Committee that Seidenberg compiled in 1960 after his resignation as Executive Director. Most of the material is fragmentary and does not form a complete record of the activities of the Committee. The official records of the Committee are part of Record Group 220 at the National Archives. Additional information on the Committee is in the papers of James Mitchell at the Eisenhower Library.

The third series consists of printed brochures, newsletters and booklets relating to labor activities, discrimination and civil rights that Seidenberg had collected. The material is arranged by origin (U.S. government or non-governmental) and thereunder by title or author.
